





Character School Conference Warwick

Every day our students work towards achieving targets that are based on our Character School traits of **RESILIENCE**, **RESPECT** and **RESPONSIBILITY**. These are not random words that we use, these are our character school traits that were decided upon a few years ago by the staff, students and Trustees who decided that these are the characteristics we all want our future generations to show. They are used every day on the student's green cards, they are commented on in students termly reports and staff set themselves targets each week using these three traits.



In November I went to a Conference for all the schools in the UK that hold the Character School Kitemark. Links Academy was the first Education Support Centre to earn the Character School Kitemark. We, along with such schools as Harrow School, Eton School and many others from around the UK have identified characteristics that we think are important for our students to exhibit every day and try hard to enable them to achieve and improve these in both lessons and other activities.

In January 2023 we will be taking the next step towards gaining the Kitemark+ Award for Character Schools. We will be starting to use a booklet that will enable all student to show how and where they are achieving their School Character School Targets by gaining stickers each time they do and putting them into their booklets. Once achieved, they will gain a Character School Award badge and this will be awarded by Mr Allen. Each student can gain the award at three levels, Bronze, Silver and Gold and everyone – including the staff - will be encouraged to 'Go for Gold' during their time here.



Attendance

It has been another great start to the term with student's attendance across all sites returning from the Summer break.

With the disruption of Covid-related lockdowns and isolations gradually becoming events of the past, attendance and punctuality to school has once again reaffirmed its importance due to the connection it has with safety and attainment for all students.

The introduction of new DfE guidance, 'Working together to improve school attendance', published to help schools maintain high levels of school attendance, along with a visit from the Local Authority Attendance Officer, has given Links Academy the opportunity to review attendance and punctuality procedures and to consider adjustments that may help.

One area Links Academy is currently looking at to help improve punctuality to school, is the formal closing of morning registration time. This would mean that any student arriving late after the registration has closed, would be registered as an *unauthorised late mark*.

Of course, if a valid reason for the lateness is explained, the mark can be changed to an **authorised late mark**, but this would be at school discretion. Unfortunately, it is becoming an increasing problem of students regularly arriving late to school in the mornings, which in turn can cause interruption to lessons in progress and disturbance to their peers learning, just by not being at school on time.

Links Academy welcomes other ideas and ways to improve attendance and punctuality to school and will be canvassing parents'/carers' and students' views via a short questionnaire at the next Student Performance Review Day (SPRD) on Monday 9 January 2023.

Please remember, it is parents'/carers' legal responsibility to ensure that your child attends school regularly and on time. If any child's unauthorised absences and lateness to school reaches more than 15 sessions (1 day = 2 sessions, therefore approximately 7 school days), parents could be at risk of a Fixed Penalty Notice.



As our Character Tree suggests, we like our students to be **Responsible** for their timekeeping and by doing so, demonstrating **Respect** to their classmates by not interrupting their learning.

The good news is that there has been plenty of *Resilience* this term with students' attendance. A staggering 90 tokens have been rewarded and earned by students for the weekly 100% attenders.

Speaking of rewards.....at Links Academy we acknowledge how important it is to recognise good levels of attendance for our students, some of whom have not always had a positive experience of attending previous schools and this term has kept us busy.


All students had completed the first half term with attendance rates ranging from 78%-98% and had all earned a 'no tricks, just treats' bag to accompany their Certificates.

Stay safe in winter – the dangers of frozen waters



Over the last few days Hertfordshire Fire & Rescue have attended water and ice incidents where people have been at risk of falling through frozen lakes and rivers due to rescuing a pet or not seeing the dangers of such activities.

Children and pets are particularly at risk when tempted to

play on the ice formed on open water, and adults can find themselves at risk in attempting to save them.

Taking a nice walk in cold weather with your family, friends or dogs in tow can be really refreshing, just make sure you know some simple tips on how to stay safe in winter.

Areas with frozen lakes, ponds, canals and reservoirs can be beautiful places to visit during the winter months but all too often many people risk their lives by venturing onto frozen water.

Here are some useful tips to help you know what to do in an emergency.

Teach children not to go on the ice

Teach children not to go onto the ice under any circumstances.

Don't go on the ice to rescue a dog

Don't go onto ice or into the water to rescue a dog, move to somewhere that the dog will be able to climb out and call them towards you.

Keep dogs on their leads

Keep dogs on their leads when near ice and don't throw sticks or toys onto the ice.

Only use well-lit areas

Time your walks to make the most of the daylight; if you need to walk in the evening only use well-lit areas or take a route not alongside water.

Keep back from the edge

When walking alongside water keep back from the edge.

Bruno's Pizza Recipe

Bruno's Puff Pastry Pizza

Ingredients

1pack ready-made puff pastry ½ carton Passata

1 tbsp Mixed herbs

1 tbsp Garlic powder

1 tbsp Onion granules

Salt and pepper

Cheddar cheese

Any other toppings of your choice



- 1. Preheat your oven to 200, gas mark 6
- 2. Roll out your puff pastry to 1cm thickness all over
- 3. Place pastry onto a lined baking tray
- 4. In a small saucepan, gently warm your passata and add your seasonings
- 5. Use a pastry brush to put your sauce onto your base, remember to do more than a thin coating, as it may dry up whilst cooking, but not to make it too sloppy, as it wont crisp up in the middle
- 6. Make sure to leave a crust around the edges
- 7. Top with cheese and anything else you want to add Bake in the over for approx 15 mins, or until base is dry and flaky
