It has been a busy but exciting term at Cedars. This term, we have welcomed two new members to our class, who have been fantastic additions to our already incredible group. Children have been working hard in all areas of their learning, however we have also managed to find time to fit in a range of fun activities.

Throughout the week, children engage in a range of different lessons, completing lessons in the core subjects of Maths and English and a range of exciting topic lessons.

Each class has a bespoke timetable created to meet the needs of the children within the class. Timetables were created through the advice and expertise from staff and outside agencies. Timetables are target focused.

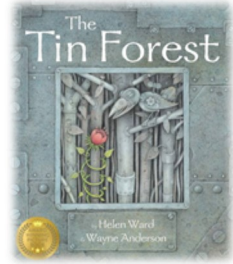
The children are aware of their target/expectation for each lesson. The idea of the timetable is for gradual progression towards the

desired outcome and therefore changes as the child becomes confident in each target. The time allocation for each lesson is dependent on the class and will change as the child progresses. We have also incorporated sensory input (Body Time) which has been thoroughly enjoyed by the children.



**English**

Each term, our English lessons are based around a text. This exposes children to a range of different texts and authors and focuses our writing around a theme. During the first half of the term, our lessons were based around visual texts including *The Bridge and Wishmaker*. These found children using short video clips to create narratives, express characters' thoughts and feelings and even retell a story orally through a puppet show.



In the second half of the term, we embraced the atmosphere of Halloween and used figurative language to describe a haunted house, wrote instructions for our own spell and even followed a set of instructions to bake and decorate our own Halloween cupcakes. We also met an old man who lived in a small house in the middle of nowhere in the book *Tin Forest* written by Helen Ward and created an impressive non-chronological report on Gorillas inspired by the story *Gorilla* written by Anthony Browne. Children engaged eagerly with the texts and provided their thoughts, feelings and opinions on various aspects and topics introduced through the text. We also found that our children have an incredible knowledge on wildlife and shared their extensive knowledge on gorillas eagerly with each other.



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We also introduced a new phonics program, *Little Wandle* and children have been working their way through their phase appropriate reading books successfully.

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**Maths**

In Maths, we use a range of resources to support our learning. We teach concrete, abstract, pictorial Maths ensuring that concepts are first taught through concrete resources such as unifix cubes or base ten before showing a concept through pictorial representation and finally applying the concept in the abstract through calculations. Children have covered various topics throughout the term including, number and place value, addition and subtraction, multiplication and division and fractions.



**History**



In History, children have been learning about World War II and have completed a range of exciting activities including growing their own 'Dig For Victory' gardens, creating 3D spitfire models and recreating various air raid shelters. They showed great respect during the 2 minutes' silence on Remembrance Day and produced some beautiful Poppy stone art and poetry to honour the fallen soldiers.



**Art**

The children have also created some impressive art pieces this term. Our focus has been on exploring colour, looking at contrast, complementary colours and greyscale art. Children thoroughly enjoyed creating their own colour wheels by mixing colours to create the needed secondary and tertiary colours.



**Mini Police**

This term, we have had Mr Bunn, our PSCO, lead weekly Mini Police sessions where the children were given their own Mini Police uniforms to wear and participated in a range of educational activities including learning a range of defensive stances, attempting the 'Bleep Test' and learning about a range of legal and illegal activities.



**Here is a little bit from Mr Bunn himself:**



**Weekly visits to Cedars and Mini Police** - Since the start of the school year I have been spending more time with the students at Cedars and it has been wonderful getting to know the children. We have chatted together and I have helped them with their work. We have completed puzzles, built Lego and, at break time, the children have worn me out playing tag! It has been a lovely way to start a Monday morning. I hope that the children feel that they have benefited and enjoyed me being around as a positive role model and representative of the Police.'

On top of this, throughout November and December I have started the Mini Police programme with the students, where we have practiced Road Safety, become more confident with staying safe online and understood what we define as bullying. I also put the students, and the staff, through their paces by completing the Bleep test!

With so much learning taking place, we have also managed to squeeze in a range of fun activities including painting our pumpkins for Halloween, a trip to Hixberry, Christmas Pantomime and Christmas Dinner. We also put our creativity to the test in our very own biscuit decorating activity.



At the end of this term, we will be saying goodbye to four of our incredible students, as they return to their mainstream schools. We want to express how incredibly proud we are of each and every one of them. We wish them nothing but success and happiness in their return and new adventures. We have had an incredible term filled with learning, fun and laughter and of course our pizza Fridays!

## Outreach Team

The secondary Outreach Team have had a busy start to the new Academic year, covering 25 schools across St Albans, Harpenden, Welwyn, Hatfield and Hertsmere, supporting students in their existing mainstream settings.

The team of four, managed by Fiona Haynes, provide a pivotal role providing a service that supports schools in understanding and developing practical and creative strategies to enable students with social and emotional needs and challenging behaviour, to become more successful learners in school.

The Outreach Team work with school staff, parents/carers and the students to help: - To reengage disaffected pupils in their mainstream school - To support students on reintegration or managed moves - To engage and work with parents/carers in their child's educational provision. The Outreach Team use their knowledge and skills to provide practical interventions within mainstream settings and have a proven track record in successfully supporting and enabling schools to aid students with social emotional and mental health needs to find practical, creative ways to meet the needs of the school and students alike.

The team provide 1-1 support developed to suit the needs of the individual and Fiona Haynes and Tracy Mehmet have recently delivered bespoke group work sessions. The team work collaboratively with their schools to help ensure a joined-up approach.

### Time to say goodbye

It was time to say goodbye to Dee B. Dee joined Links Academy in 2018 and has been a pivotal team member in the Secondary Outreach Team. The team threw a surprise afternoon tea party, with homemade cakes and biscuits.

## **NESSie:**



NESSie aims to provide therapeutic support for children in Y2-Y7 who may:  
show signs of developing Emotionally Based School Avoidance (EBSA)  
be on reduced timetables because of anxiety  
have trauma and attachment needs that impact on attendance

NESSie provide art therapies (Art, Drama and Music), using creativity and imagination to improve mental health and are particularly helpful to those who prefer a less verbal approach. Children and young people use drama, music or art to explore, express, reflect and recover from difficult or challenging events. Art therapist are clinicians and are registered and regulated in the UK.

## **Making a referral**

NESSie supports children in years 2-7 with moderate mental health difficulties whose needs cannot be better met by another service and fall within the Local Authority's priority areas. Referrals are only accepted from schools and parent consent is needed.

Before making a referral, both the parent and school should complete the Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaire and upload the forms to the referral portal. The information in the questionnaire will help the therapist decide whether NESSie is the right service for the young person.

## INCLUSION TEAM

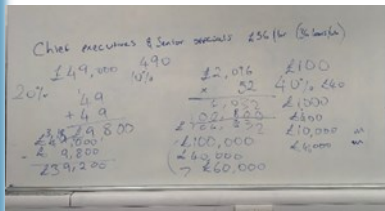
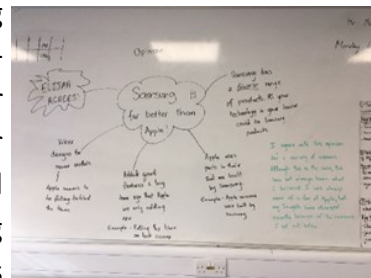
### What a positive start it has been this term in the Inclusion Unit!

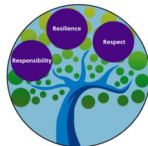

## HEALTHY LIFESTYLES

For numerous reasons, this term has seen quite a focus upon personal safety.

A wealth of information was made available to students just prior to the summer holidays, providing advice around covering keeping safe over the holidays and into our new term in September.

This included handy hints, tips, and support services for:

- Drugs & alcohol
- LGBT+ issues
- Sun screen/sun safety
- Storm safety
- KOOTH/Spectrum CGL/Papyrus
- On-line/internet safety



Smoking & Vaping awareness/Quit-line. Following on from the anti-smoking advice, October saw our annual push to join the *StopTober* national campaign. This year's theme concentrated on the *benefits* of quitting – improving not only our mental and physical health, but also our (diminishing) finances.

Advice was given in assemblies and during 1:1 sessions, encouraging those who smoke or vape to cut down – and ideally stop altogether – and for those who don't smoke not to start.

Most smokers want to quit, but it can take several attempts to do so over a lifetime. Research shows that successful abstinence is achieved when support is sought – Smokers rarely succeed in quitting alone!

There is no consensus about vaping harms currently and the market place is not as stringently regulated as it should be. It is such a new phenomenon that it can be difficult to find accurate, reliable information.

Vape manufacturers will not admit to deliberately targeting young people, but we all know that the bright colours and delicious 'flavours' have been cynically created with the teenage market in mind. We should remember that the smoking industry relies on recruiting fresh new users to replace all those smoking adults who have died prematurely...

New legislation is due in December, which will see a ban on the manufacture and sale of ‘disposable vapes’. How this will affect the public’s use of vapes remains to be seen.



One of the brand names likely to be affected are ‘ELF bar’ vapes, as there have been reported safety concerns. (Presumably, after using them you need to contact the National Elf Service?)

There are other proposed changes pending, including having graphic pictures on the boxes (like with cigarettes), and a total ban on specific harmful chemicals, which are synonymous with certain ‘fruit’ flavours.

Hopefully, the ban on disposable vapes will also have a positive impact on the amount of plastic being dumped – an estimated **5 million vapes a week**, in the UK alone.

For those determined to vape, the advice is to purchase them from specialist vape shops, rather than online (this helps to reduce the amount of fake or illegal vapes coming into the UK, which contain more than 2mg of nicotine), to take fewer puffs, and to avoid some fruit flavours.

Despite the changes in law, it looks like vaping is here to stay for the meantime. Perhaps there will be a ‘festive’ launch of Turkey & Cranberry or Xmas Pudding & Custard flavours?

Finally, we have reminded students that there have been further changes to the drug laws recently.

On November 8<sup>th</sup> Nitrous Oxide (also known as ‘Laughing Gas’, ‘balloons’ or ‘Nos’), became illegal to possess as well as to supply.



It is now a **Class C** drug – Placing it in the same category as non-prescribed tranquillisers, anabolic steroids, and Khat.

This means the consequences of being caught in possession could be a maximum of 2yrs imprisonment, and supplying it (for misuse) is 14yrs. There are also unlimited fines which can be ordered by the courts.

We have probably all seen the small silver canisters lying around in parks, or on the streets, but things have moved on somewhat. Young people are taking bigger risks by inhaling the gas from increasingly large cylinders, called ‘SmartWhip’.



To give you an idea of the scale of usage, here’s a picture of the number of canisters dumped during this year’s Notting Hill Carnival - All **13 tonnes** of it!

## Design & Technology

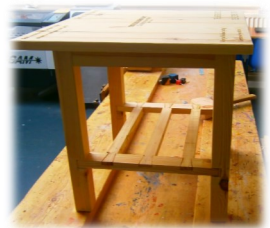
Congratulations are due to three of our current Year 11 students who have already completed their NCFE Level 2 Construction course and passed! This means that they already have the equivalent of a GCSE qualification before finishing year 11!



**Charlie** made his table from solid re-claimed oak and mahogany and added pine legs. The top was made of individual pieces of oak and mahogany cut into wedges that when glued together made an octagonal top of alternating colours. Not satisfied with making a highly complex jigsaw of individual pieces for the top, Charlie then decided to make the legs an X shape to ensure that his Maths skills were used too!



**Bruno** made his table from pine and laser-etched some inspirational messages across the top. The joints he hand-cut were of a really good standard and included both cross halving and dovetail joints. The top is made from laminated solid pine and has a routed rounded edge. Each part of the table was made with care and a high level of accuracy.



**Mujahid** made a puzzle box that had a hidden compartment only openable by solving the puzzle. He used reclaimed mahogany laminated with pine and oak to get a triple layer effect. He had to glue all three timbers together before chiselling out the centre, then slicing and re-assembling the parts to make the box and container for the box. Finally, he had to hand-cut the jigsaw piece at the end through all of the layers of hardwood to make the locking mechanism.

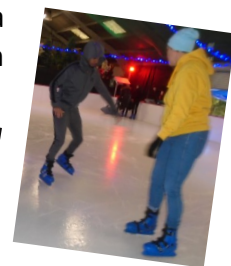

## Attendance Update

You may be aware from the newspapers and various media outlets that the Government is becoming increasingly concerned of the attendance of young people to school and the tightening of the rules and regulations around student attendance.

We are now legally required to inform the Local Authority's Attendance Team when a child has had the equivalent of 10 days' absence from school. The Local Authority is now legally required to intervene much earlier when a child's absence has reached 10 days.

Whilst fines and court appearances will always be the last resort both schools and Local Authorities are expected to impose these sanctions when all else fails.

If any child's unauthorised absences and lateness to school reaches more than 15 sessions (1 day = 2 sessions, therefore approximately 7 school days), parents could be at risk of a Fixed Penalty Notice. It remains parents/carers legal responsibility to ensure that a child attends school regularly and on time. This means that a child must attend every day that the school is open, except in a small number of allowable circumstances such as being too ill to attend or being given permission for an absence in advance from school.

This is essential for a child to get the most out of their school experience including their attainment, well-being and wider life chances. Additionally, regular attendance to school can act as an important protective factor and the best opportunity for needs to be identified and support provide.

Fortunately, through the work of schools Attendance Teams and the support of parents most attendance issues can be resolved before we need to resort the legal actions. However, the Local Authority will be notified of irregular attendance and consecutive unexplained absences and parents/carers informed should this apply to your child.



With the Autumn Term coming to a close there was time to celebrate some fantastic individual attendance at Links Academy. Eight students achieved over 90% attendance and were invited to visit Mrs Brown for hot chocolate and marshmallows in recognition of their achievement.

The Cedars PSB students took a special trip to Links Academy, Hixberry School on Friday 15 December 2023.

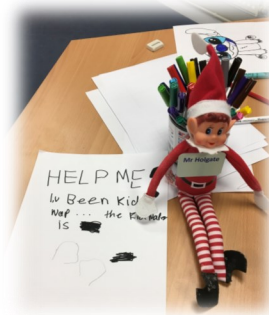
